

Dear Good Shepherd Family,

This is the strangest time I can remember in my life. In speaking with our members who have lived much longer than me, I've been surprised to learn they share the same sentiment. The word "unprecedented" gets thrown around a lot to describe this time. But there are a lot of other words and thoughts that come to my mind. Some of those thoughts are appropriate to share here; others, not so much.



My life has been marked by great change in the last 6 or 7 months, I've taken a new call, moved to a new house, memorized the names of hundreds of new people, said goodbye to my father, become a part-time homeschool teacher, learned how to pastor during a pandemic, and learned how to completely clear and revamp my calendar for months at a time. This work is difficult and it continues. I'm still learning and growing. Some days, I think I'm getting the hang of it. Other days, it feels like I'm barely hanging on. Perhaps some of you can relate to this feeling. I say this not to overwhelm you or make you feel bad, but on the contrary, I find that it helps me to know that others can relate to my struggles. You all have your own struggles and I want you to know that I am here and your church family is here for you. You all have certainly been here for me and I am grateful for that.

I have heard words from some of my acquaintances and I have seen posted on social media some statements about this time that employ questionable theology and I want to help us think about this time in a Christ-centered way. Hear me clearly: God does not cause pandemics. We live in a broken world marked by sin and death—a world in which danger and disease are bound to happen. But this is never the work of God. God is the one who brings life out of death as evidenced by the resurrection of Christ. In our gospel lesson this coming week we will hear Jesus himself say that he has come "that we may have life, and have it abundantly." God did not cause this pandemic. God is not "trying to get our attention" with this virus. This is not God's way of "getting us to straighten up and fly right."

Yet it is important that we see God's presence and work in our lives during this time. We may see God's work as opportunities for reflection, for improvement, and for repentance. I know I have been thankful, for instance, to have so much time with my family. Being in a new call, I was getting into the habit of being in meetings almost every night some weeks. It was getting rarer and rarer to see my children in the evenings before their bedtime. This pandemic has allowed me a chance to reevaluate my priorities. As important as church meetings are, my work as a father is more important and I need to find a healthier balance. Where have you seen God at work in your life? Where are your opportunities for development and change? God's hand is not causing disease and death, but where is God working to reform and re-center your life? How can you grow in your faith during this time?

God is most definitely working among us during this time. I marvel that churches, including our own, have been as flexible and adaptive as we have been. I marvel that our stewardship has held steady—and in some ways improved—during this difficult time. I marvel that God has used us all in new ways to support and encourage each other and our neighbors. I marvel that we hunger for the word and sacraments in new ways during this time. God is with us. I am here with you. We will get through this together—strengthened in our ministry, renewed in our faith, and made whole again by the love and mercy of Christ.
