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PASTOR'S MESSAGE

We can't think about church ministry in the same we have before. A colleague recently mentioned that he's been sharing that message with his congregation, but he didn't think he was getting through. But recently, one disciple said to him: Pastor, it's not just us. Other congregations are in the same boat as we are.

It feels like the changes the church is undergoing have happened in the twinkling of an eye, but those who study congregational and societal changes first noticed the symptoms many decades ago. Acknowledging that significant change is upon the church is critical for congregational growth.

David Brown is a pastor and church consultant. In a recent blogpost he wrote: The tyranny of the urgent dominates our workplaces, homes, public squares, and churches. We put more effort behind the tried and true methods and models of our institutional past, but find them producing diminishing returns. What we do know and are comfortable doing just doesn't seem to work as well as it once did. We double down, work harder, and worry more. Our creativity is stifled, and our anxiety level continues to rise. Too often our churches take cues from the restless anxiety, widespread fear, and exaggerated climate.

Can we let go the push to fill committee positions with warm bodies rather than encouraging disciples to pursue their passions and engage their giftedness? Can we stop scheduling programs and meetings that do not resonate with our core identity and mission? Can we create space for those connected with our churches to experience communal rest and to develop deep, meaningful relationships with another?

We cannot recreate the "golden age" of the first century church or the nostalgia of the "glory days" of the late 20th century church. Bu maybe we could sit around the table together a little more often, create time to listen and pray with one another, celebrate and cultivate community across lines of difference. Who knows what might happen if we did.

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SUNDAY Join us for Sunday SCHOOL School in February

The Come & See Class, which meets in Classroom 1 in the sanctuary basement, will be studying the parables in Matthew. This study will focus on the ten parables that are found only in Matthew. Through parables Jesus revealed "the knowledge of the secrets of the kingdom of heaven" (Mt 13:11-15) and "utters things hidden since the creation of the world" (Mt 13:34-35). We will seek to discover the secrets disclosed in each parable and will consider how these parables challenge us in our spiritual and in our secular lives. All are welcome to come and see what these parables are saying to God's people. The study leader will be **Bruce Shealy**.

In Classroom 2, <u>The Around the Corner Class</u> will be looking at the Enneagram 9 Personality Traits and taking a class on each one. This class will be using a book called Nine Portraits of Jesus, Discovering Jesus through the Enneagram. You can find your Enneagram type by taking a test at 9Types.com or the Enneagram Institute. We will be looking at Type 6, 7, 8, and 9. We will discuss how to finish the rest of the year with either a book study or a discussion. The study leader will be **Peter Zornow**.

In the <u>Parlor Class</u>, <u>Mitch Mackinem</u> will lead the class in conducting an in-depth examination of Romans through February and March.

The Fellowship Class, in Classroom 5, will be led by Lula Camp using the Methodist Adult Bible Series. The February topic is Self-Controlled, Upright Godly Faith. This will include class discussion and the singing of some familiar hymns.

Food Pantry

Food Pantry Sunday is the third Sunday of each month, however, food donations may be left in the bin outside the church office at any time. Items that are always

needed are rice, peanut butter and jelly, pasta and pasta sauce, canned meats, canned vegetables, and hot and cold cereals. Food is given out each Wednesday afternoon. The number of persons coming for food varies from week to week, but so far this year we have had as many as 26 requests one week and as low as five another week.

In 2017, we had 172 persons representing 714 family members come for food. There were 439 visits (some came only once or twice, a few came as many as 10 times) representing a total of 1,758 persons receiving food. Recipients can come only once a month.

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Season of Lent -

Time for Reflecting, Reconnecting and Recommitting

From February 14 (Ash Wednesday), continuing to March 31 (Holy Saturday), we will celebrate the 40 days of Lent. When we look at the calendar, however, we realize there

are actually 46 days in that time period. Those extra days are the Sundays not included in the Lenten observance. During these "free" days, it is traditional to celebrate the resurrection of Christ – "little Easters." For we are indeed "Easter people."

What is your tradition for the season? Rooted in Jesus' 40 days of fasting in the wilderness, do you fast? Do you give up something? Or do you add something? Usually if one does something for that length of time – 40 days – it becomes a habit. During this time, we are able to reflect, examine and learn. Lent is about spiritual results.

With this Lenten season, let's commit to continuing or adding a habit of coming together for all the opportunities offered to us during this holy season. Begin with attending our repentant Ash Wednesday service. Share in a time of fellowship, food and worship the five Wednesday evenings, 6:30, in Lent. A noontime worship opportunity will also be available. Join in the reflective services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. And, recommit to attending Sunday School and worship each Sunday.

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LECTIONARY FOR FEBRUARY 2018

FEBRUARY 4 - FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

In Isaiah it is the one God who sits above the earth and numbers the stars—it is that God who strengthens the powerless. So in Jesus' healing work we see the hand of the creator God, lifting up the sick woman to health and service (diakonia). Like Simon's mother-in-law, we are lifted up to health and diakonia. Following Jesus, we strengthen the powerless; like Jesus, we seek to renew our own strength in quiet times of prayer.

First Reading: Isaiah 40:21-31

The Judeans in exile have a good reason to be hopeful: the one who will bring them to freedom is the God who created the world, the God who subdues the rulers of the earth and gives strength to those who are weary.

Psalm: Psalm 147:1-11, 20c

The LORD heals the brokenhearted. (Ps. 147:3)

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 9:16-23

God entrusted Paul with the responsibility of bringing the gospel to diverse people. Hence the focus of Paul's ministry is not his own rights or privileges as an apostle but the privilege of serving God by freely sharing the good news of Christ with others.

Gospel: Mark 1:29-39

Everywhere Jesus goes, many people expect him to set them free from oppression. Everywhere he goes, he heals them and sets them free. Disease, devils, and death are running for their lives. The forces that diminish human life are rendered powerless by Jesus.

FEBRUARY 11- TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD

The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus' baptism and end with three disciples' vision of his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus' baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit descending and hears the words from heaven. But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the same words naming him God's beloved son. As believers, Paul writes, we are enabled to see the God-light in Jesus' face, because the same God who created light in the first place has shone in our hearts to give us that vision. The light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened us through baptism and shines in us also for others to see.

First Reading: 2 Kings 2:1-12

Today's reading centers on the transfer of power and authority from the prophet Elijah to Elisha. Their travels, which retrace the path of Joshua back to Moab (the place where Moses died) and the parting of the waters, demonstrate that Elisha and Elijah are legitimate successors of the great prophet Moses.

Psalm: Psalm 50:1-6

Out of Zion, perfect in beauty, God shines forth in

glory. (Ps. 50:2)

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

The spotlight of Christian ministry is not on the people who carry out ministry but on the Lord Jesus Christ. Just as God made light shine out of darkness at creation, God makes the light of Jesus Christ shine in our lives through Christian ministry.

Gospel: Mark 9:2-9

Mark's gospel presents the transfiguration as a preview of what would become apparent to Jesus' followers after he rose from the dead. Confused disciples are given a vision of God's glory manifest in the beloved Son.

FEBRUARY 18 - FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT

On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.

First Reading: Genesis 9:8-17

Today's reading is the conclusion to the flood story. Because of human sin, the Lord destroys the earth by flood, saving only Noah, his family, and the animals on the ark. Yet divine destruction gives way to divine commitment. As in the first creation, God blesses humanity and establishes a covenant with all creatures.

Psalm: Psalm 25:1-10

Your paths, O LORD, are steadfast love and

faithfulness. (Ps. 25:10)

Second Reading: 1 Peter 3:18-22

As God acted through Christ's suffering and death to bring us to God, so God acts through baptism to save us from a sinful existence. This spiritual cleansing marks our new life in Christ.

Gospel: Mark 1:9-15

The Spirit that comes upon Jesus at his baptism sustains him when he is tested by Satan so that he might proclaim the good news of God's reign.

FEBRUARY 25 - SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

The second covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in baptism, as we put on Christ.

First Reading: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

As with Noah, God makes an everlasting covenant with Abraham and Sarah. God promises this old couple that they will be the ancestors of nations, though they have no child together. God will miraculously bring forth new life from Sarah's old womb. The name changes emphasize the firmness of God's promise.

Psalm: Psalm 22:23-31

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD. (Ps. 22:27)

Second Reading: Romans 4:13-25

Paul presents Abraham as the example for how a person comes into a right relationship with God not through works of the law but through faith. Though Abraham and Sarah were far too old for bearing children, Abraham trusted that God would accomplish what God had promised to accomplish.

Gospel: Mark 8:31-38

After Peter confesses his belief that Jesus is the Messiah, Jesus tells his disciples for the first time what is to come. Peter's response indicates that he does not yet understand the way of the cross that Jesus will travel.

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
