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PASTOR'S MESSAGE

It's been a long time since I've been to Washington, DC, and I'm headed there the day after Easter Sunday. However, I won't be doing any sightseeing. Bishop Elizabeth Eaton

has extended an invitation to ELCA disciples to join her on April 4 on the National Mall for A.C.T. Unite to End Racism and to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the death of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Bishop Herman Yoos invited South Carolina Lutherans to join him at the rally and to travel there on one of the buses the Synod is chartering. I plan to be on one of those buses.

A.C.T. stands for awaken, confront, and transform. It's tempting to think that our nation's racial divide has been closed now that over fifty years have passed since the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was signed into law. But it's not the case. The Southern Poverty Law Center (SPLC) tracks the activity of 917 active hate groups in the United States, along with an additional 623 antigovernment groups. Here in the South Carolina Midlands the SPLC has confirmed activity on three fronts: Ku Klux Klan, Black Separatist, and White Nationalist. Other groups are operational in the Greenville-Spartanburg area, Charleston/Lowcountry, and Aiken.

Racism is still alive and kicking in overt ways such as Dylann Roof's murder of the nine disciples at Mother Emmanuel, Charleston, and it makes its presence known in subtler ways. It's commonplace for me to hear comments like: "I was driving the other day, and this black man/woman pulled out right in front of me!" I never hear: "I was driving the other day, and this white man/woman pulled out right in front of me!" Poor drivers are poor drivers regardless of race or color. We say this sort of thing without considering what we are communicating. It's a sneaky form of racism, and it's why the key points of April rally are awaken, confront, and transform.

Information about reserving a seat for the trip to Washington is found on p. 3. I hope you'll join me and others who are making the trip to the National Mall. It will be a sight to see.



COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

February 25, 2018, marked a new milestone in the life of Good Shepherd. We have officially begun the search for our next pastor. After a fabulous covered dish lunch, Bishop Herman Yoos and Assistant to the Bishop, Ginny Aebischer, led us in a "Spirit Led Time of Renewal."

During this time two scripture passages were read. The first was from Romans 12: 1-5 and the second was from Romans 12: 9-21. Each individual was asked to think about the scripture and write down what they heard God saying in each passage and how does it apply to the life of this congregation. Each round table was asked to summarize their responses and share them with the entire group.

Once that portion was completed, everyone was asked to help with the congregational profile. There were two questions to be answered:

- 1. What are three of your greatest hopes for this congregation?
- 2. What are the significant wounds that God wants to heal in this congregation that will prepare you to support a newly called Pastor and a new future?

The final exercise was to answer two questions and put the answers on sticky notes:

- 1. What new things do we want to start doing?
- 2. Are there some things we need to let go of? What are things that drain your energy for God's mission?

The sticky notes were placed on poster boards in the FAB. Now the notes will be assimilated by members of the council and the results given to the members of the congregation, the Call Committee, and the Synod Office.

After all this is completed, the Call Committee will be selected at the March 2018 Council meeting. They will then begin the search for our new pastor. This could be a lengthy process so patience needs to be shown by each and every one of us. Remember our time is not God's time. We just need to be still and pray for the Call Committee and for our congregation as we go about our everyday task.

I would like to say a special thank you to all the people who have stepped up as volunteers during this time. Yesterday's response to our "Spirit Led Renewal" was very good. Thank you for your time and participation in this event. We estimate that there were about 160 people who attended.

During this time of transition, it will be very important that the laity at GSLC continue to actively work together to move our ministry forward. Remember that Laypersons also are called to do the work of the Church. Our active involvement will help facilitate the Call Process and will send a strong, positive message to candidates. I will close by asking every one to be patient and to pray each day for the Holy Spirit to work as we go forth in this new time.

An Invitation from Bishop Yoos

Why am I planning to participate in a rally to end racism on April 4th in Washington, D.C.?

As your bishop I have witnessed the significant conversations that are happening around our state with the showing of the Selma movie. These conversations have

brought together over 110 African-American and Lutheran congregations in dialogue about our need for racial reconciliation and healing.

When I attended the funeral for Pastor Clementa Pinckney, after the shooting of the Emmanuel Nine martyrs, I was deeply troubled to see his two young daughters being deprived of their father's loving care and guidance because of racism and hate. I promised myself that day that I would do all that I could in the future to prevent another tragedy like that one and to honor the forgiveness and grace that these nine families modeled so well.

When Bishop Eaton extended an invitation to have at least 5,000 ELCA Lutherans commemorate the 50th anniversary of the assassination of The Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. on April 4th, I knew that South Carolina Lutherans needed to be present as well.

If you are interested in being a part of this historic march, I invite you to join me and others as we need to fill up several buses. The cost will be \$75.00 per person. We will drive overnight to Washington, D.C. on Tuesday evening and return on Wednesday evening following the rally. Join me in following the call of our Presiding Bishop to share how God is bringing us together across the historic division of racism and hate.

MARCH COME & SEE CLASS

The <u>Come & See Class</u> will continue the study of the Parables of Matthew through March 11. This study focuses on the ten parables that are recorded only in the Gospel of Matthew. Jesus told parables to "reveal the knowledge of the secrets of the kingdom of heaven" and to "utter



things hidden since the creation of the world." These parables underscore and compliment the central themes of Matthew. Come & see what "secrets" these parables might contain and how the message pertains to your spiritual life and your walk with Christ. Bruce Shealy is the class leader for this series.

Experience the Open Bible Study: An Easter Exploration

You're invited to experience the Open Bible Study method of exploring scripture. Dr. Bob Hawkins will lead a band of Good Shepherd explorers into a method of scripture reading and devotion which was first developed for people who never before had encountered Jesus, let alone Christianity. Our Order of Confession during Lent helps us to express our regret to bear witness to the presence of Christ in our lives. We're not always sure just exactly how Jesus is present to us and through us. We hesitate to share our faith and the stories of scriptures with others simply because we're not sure what to say. We may well fear we'll appear to be the Bible thumpers who rarely reflect the loving God in whose image we are made.

Beginning March 18 and continuing through May 6, Bob will gather folks to read, reflect, and explore the Gospel passages appointed for the Easter Season. We'll learn how to ask questions of the texts we hear. We'll discover we can express our wonder, doubts, and excitement about familiar and unfamiliar verses. Like Thomas [he always shows up the Second Sunday of Easter] we can say to Jesus and the Bible – "Show me! I don't get it yet!" He's not dismissed because he has doubts. Jesus simply provides him what he needs.

Each week we'll read the Gospel we'll hear in Church two weeks later [that means our first text will be the Easter Sunday Gospel]. We'll hear it several times, read by different folks each time. Then, we'll have opportunity first to indicate what we haven't heard before, something that challenges us, something we don't understand, and even something we want to remember for whatever reason. Then, after hearing the passage again, we'll explore the questions and insights we have. By the end of class we should be able to say, "I want to chew on this for the coming week."

There are lots of ways to study the Bible, and lots of curricula which can aid or complicate the task considerably. Often we unwittingly adopt a classroom professor / student setting. When's the final exam? Will I reveal my ignorance simply by opening my mouth? Why didn't I pay attention during Confirmation? If that is your reoccurring nightmare — put it to rest. So come; all are invited, and take heart, for God indeed is with us, our mouths, hearts, and minds, and will teach us "...what we are to speak."

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LECTIONARY FOR MARCH 2018

MARCH 4 - THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

The third covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the central one of Israel's history: the gift of the law to those God freed from slavery. The ten commandments are one of the chief parts of Luther's catechism, a core piece of baptismal instruction. They begin with the statement that because God alone has freed us from the powers that oppressed us, we are to let nothing else claim first place in our lives. When Jesus throws the merchants out of the temple, he is defending the worship of God alone and rejecting the ways commerce and profit-making can become our gods.

First Reading: Exodus 20:1-17

After escaping from slavery, the Israelites come to Mount Sinai, where God teaches them how to live in community. The ten commandments proclaim that God alone is worthy of worship. Flowing from God, the life of the community flourishes when based on honesty, trust, fidelity, and respect for life, family, and property.

Psalm: Psalm 19

The commandment of the Lord gives light to the eyes. (Ps. 19:8)

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:18-25

The word of the cross is pure foolishness and nonsense to the world because it claims that God is mostly revealed in weakness, humiliation, and death. But through such divine foolishness and weakness, God is working to save us. The center of Paul's preaching is Christ crucified.

Gospel: John 2:13-22

Jesus attacks the commercialization of religion by driving merchants out of the temple. When challenged, he responds mysteriously, with the first prediction of his own death and resurrection. In the midst of a seemingly stable religious center, Jesus suggests that the center itself has changed.

MARCH 11 - FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith, for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

First Reading: Numbers 21:4-9

Though God provides food and water for the Israelites in the wilderness, they whine and grumble. They forget about the salvation they experienced in the exodus. God punishes them for their sin, but when they repent God also provides a means of healing: a bronze serpent lifted up on a pole.

Psalm: Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22

You deliver your people from their distress. (Ps. 107:19)

Second Reading: Ephesians 2:1-10

While we were dead in our sinfulness, God acted to make us alive as a gift of grace in Christ Jesus. We are saved not by what we do but by grace through faith. Thus our good works are really a reflection of God's grace at work in our lives.

Gospel: John 3:14-21

To explain the salvation of God to the religious leader, Nicodemus, Jesus refers to the scripture passage quoted in today's first reading. Just as those who looked upon the bronze serpent were healed, so people will be saved when they behold Christ lifted up on the cross.

SUNDAY, MARCH 18 - FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

God promises Jeremiah that a "new covenant" will be made in the future: a covenant that will allow all the people to know God by heart. The church sees this promise fulfilled in Christ, who draws all people to himself when he is lifted up on the cross. Our baptismal covenant draws us to God's heart through Christ and draws God's light and truth into our hearts. We see God's heart most clearly in the way Jesus shares human suffering, in an agony both the John and Hebrews readings describe.

First Reading: Jeremiah 31:31-34

The Judeans in Babylon blamed their exile on their ancestors, who had broken the covenant established at Sinai. Here the prophet looks to a day when God will make a new covenant with the people. There will be no need to teach the law, because God will write it on their hearts.

Psalm: Psalm 51:1-12

Create in me a clean heart, O God. (Ps. 51:10)

Second Reading: Hebrews 5:5-10

Using priestly imagery and references to the Old Testament, the author explains how Christ lived in trusting obedience to God, and so God has made Christ the source of our eternal salvation.

Gospel: John 12:20-33

Jesus entered Jerusalem for the last time to celebrate the Passover festival. Here Jesus' words about seeds planted in the ground turn the disaster of his death into the promise of a harvest in which everyone will be gathered.

MARCH 25 - SUNDAY OF THE PASSION / PALM SUNDAY

The first and second readings and psalm are the same this Sunday every year: Christ emptying himself of divine power and protection, willingly becoming vulnerable to those who struck him and put him to death. With Christ we lament his suffering and all human suffering, but expect God's final vindication. Mark's passion story begins with an unnamed woman anointing his head, perhaps to proclaim him Messiah, and Jesus saying she has anointed him beforehand for burial. Mark's Easter story will begin with women going to anoint Jesus for burial, only to find that he has been raised, God's living Anointed One.

First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-9a

The image of the servant of the Lord is one of the notable motifs in the book of Isaiah. Today's reading describes the mission of the servant, whom early Christians associated with Jesus. Like Jesus, the servant does not strike back at his detractors but trusts in God's steadfast love.

Psalm: Psalm 31:9-16

Into your hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit. (Ps. 31:5)

Second Reading: Philippians 2:5-11

Christ did not act to attain status and glory but was obedient to God even to the point of death. Following Christ's example, we do not seek personal status or glory but care for others as God cared for us in Christ's death.

Gospel: Mark 14:1--15:47

The passion story in Mark's gospel presents Jesus as one who dies abandoned by all. He shows himself to be the true Son of God by giving his life for those who have forsaken him.
