COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As President of the congregation and the Council of Good Shepherd for 2018, I would like to share a few thoughts with each of you. As we all know 2017 was a year filled with a lot of emotion both in our church and in the world as a whole. First Cody Jones, the Director of Music, left for a full-time teaching career, and then Pastor Paul accepted a call to a church in Winston-Salem, N.C. Shortly thereafter, Pastor Kris accepted a call from a church in Mt. Pleasant, S.C. Both of these people were an integral part of our family for quite some time. With their departure things started to change. Barbara Hunter, our Parish Coordinator, resigned to move back to lowa to be with her family.

In October, we called Pastor Karen Hawkins to be our interim pastor, our spiritual leader, and to work with the laity as we seek to grow our ministry in this place. I am pleased to announce that her contract with Good Shepherd was unanimously approved for another six months. During this time she will challenge each and every one of us to help us discern what is best for Good Shepherd as a church and as a light for the community around us.

Even before the departure of Pastor Paul and Pastor Kris, there had been a decline in worship attendance and participation in the programs offered here at Good Shepherd. We have lost a good number of long time active members who passed away to their eternal rest. In addition, some long time members and some of our younger families are not participating in church programs as they have done in the past. Of course with less participation from the members, we see a decline in contributions and pledges used to meet our annual budget. I have heard people say things like, "We need more people in church on Sunday," "We need more people in Sunday School classes", "We need more small groups", and on and on. However, in order to have these things we need each and every person to participate and grow our ministries. We need the laity to step up and come to worship on Sunday morning, come to Sunday School, volunteer for helping get a small group started and more important make the small group thrive over the long term. It has been proven that when small groups are successful new members who are part of these groups tend to feel more welcome and at home in their new church.

We want this to be a place where there is passion about the services and the programs offered and a place where we know one another and work together to make God's people outside our walls feel welcome when they enter to hear the Gospel.

Working together and participating as brothers and sisters in Christ and most important, with the help and direction of the Holy Spirit, each and every one of us can make a difference. A heartfelt thank you to all who have been here and a warm welcome back to those who may have taken a leave of absence.

As you read this, pray for our church, its council, its pastor and most important our members who together can make this all happen.



LENTEN OFFERINGS

Traditionally during Lent we give up material things to focus our attention on God's spiritual gifts and to provide aid to the poor.

In February you received a special offering envelope so you could make daily offerings throughout the Lenten season. You are invited to return your offering during Holy Week. Our Lenten Offerings go to local charities that assist homeless individuals and families: The Family Shelter, The Providence Home for Men, and The Women's Shelter.

The Family Shelter provides emergency shelter for up to 120 days for 15 families at a time. Residents receive help in finding employment and affordable housing so they can become independent. The Family Shelter also provides counseling and parent education classes.

The Providence Home for Men is to help stabilize the living conditions of dislocated men and to encourage progress in realizing their full personal potential in self-sufficient living through the power of Jesus Christ.

The Women's Shelter provides a variety of support services for "women in crisis." It provides temporary shelter for up to 90 days and transitional housing for up to two years, serving about 90 residents a year.



ELCA Conference of Bishops issues statement of support

ITASCA (March 6, 2017) - The ELCA Conference of Bishops has approved the following statement of support for the March for Our Lives on March 24. STATEMENT IN SOLIDARITY WITH OUR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

Our children and youth are like a young Jeremiah prophesying to the people: For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. (Jer. 29:11)

Recently, the students, faculty and staff at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida experienced tragedy. Seventeen people - students and teachers - were killed by a 19-year-old shooter. In response, students have invited their teachers, families and allies around the nation to join with them for a March for Our Lives on March 24, 2018 in Washington, DC; calling our country into a deeper conversation about school safety and second amendment rights and responsibilities.

We recognize this incident is the latest in a long list of tragic shootings in our country and young people have been calling for protest and change for many years. Some of those young voices have been ignored or silenced because of racial and economic injustice. We cannot let that reality keep us from acting now.

Adopted in 1994, the ELCA social message on Community Violence remains sadly relevant today. The message speaks about the causes of violence as complex and pervasive, and of how violence breeds violence. In proclaiming the forgiveness and love of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the church addresses the root of violence while being committed to social actions that respond directly to violence and the people it affects.

From the Social Message: In the face of violence, God's resolve for peace in human communities is unshakable. Deliberate acts to harm or kill innocent people violate God's intention for human community. God's commandment is "You shall not murder" (Ex. 20:13). In proclaiming God's law, we declare that all people are accountable before God and the community to honor and respect the life God has given. Christians, as salt of the earth (Mt. 5:13) and light of the world (Mt. 5:14), are called to respond to violent crime in the restorative ways taught by Jesus (Mt. 5:38-39) and shown by his actions (Jn. 8:3-11). We are empowered to take up the challenge to prevent violence and to attack the complex causes that make violence so pervasive.

According to Lutheran theology, society is to be ruled by the civil use of the Law. Government is responsible under God for the protection of its citizens and the maintenance of justice and public order. As citizens in a democracy, we have the responsibility to join with others to hold government accountable for protecting society and ensuring justice for all, and to seek changes in policies and practices toward these ends.

That social message was amplified by a social statement, For Peace in God's World (1995) which, as part of its adoption, offered concrete implementation actions, including: To call upon the members and leaders of this church to support our youth in their struggle to define their identity and vocation as present and future peacemakers...

The Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, in solidarity with our children and youth, and in response to our common baptismal vocation: living among God's faithful people, hearing the word of God and sharing in the Lord's Supper, proclaiming the good news of God in Christ through word and deed. serving all people following the example of Jesus, and striving for justice and peace in all the earth; offer our support, partnership and prayers for the March for Our Lives, its satellite city events, and our children and youth who are leading us forward as peacemakers.

LECTIONARY FOR APRIL 2018

April 1 - Resurrection of Our Lord: Easter Day

This year may be the one in which John's resurrection account is likely to be chosen over Mark's, perhaps because Mark's gospel ends so abruptly, with astonishment and fear rather than joyful proclamation. Yet Mark may speak to our experience more directly than the other gospels. Corinthians and Acts fill out the story by telling of appearances of the risen Christ. Peter says we "ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead." And so do we, in a foretaste of the mountaintop feast where death will be no more.

First Reading: Acts 10:34-43

Peter crosses the immense religious and social boundary that separates Jews from Gentiles in order to proclaim the good news of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, so that God's forgiveness in Jesus' name would reach out to the Gentiles just as it had to Jews.

Psalm: Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24

This is the day that the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. (Ps. 118:24)

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

The core of the Christian faith and Paul's preaching is the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As the crucified and risen Christ appeared to the earliest of his followers, so we experience the presence of the risen Lord in the preaching of this faith.

Gospel: Mark 16:1-8

The resurrection of Jesus is announced, and the response is one of terror and amazement.

Sunday, April 8, 2018 Second Sunday of Easter

The Easter season is a week of weeks, seven Sundays when we play in the mystery of Christ's presence, mostly through the glorious Gospel of John. Today we gather with the disciples on the first Easter, and Jesus breathes the Spirit on us. With Thomas we ask for a sign, and Jesus offers us his wounded self in the broken bread. From frightened individuals we are transformed into a community of open doors, peace, forgiveness, and material sharing such that no one among us is in need.

First Reading: Acts 4:32-35

While the apostles testified to others about the resurrection of Jesus, the early Christian community shared what they owned or sold their possessions to help their fellow believers who were in need.

Psalm: Psalm 133

How good and pleasant it is to live together in unity. (Ps. 133:1)

Second Reading: 1 John 1:1--2:2

The opening of this letter serves as a reality check. The reality of God is light, but our confessed reality has been sin. God cleanses us from our sinful reality through Christ's death so that we live in fellowship with Christ and walk in God's light.

Gospel: John 20:19-31

The story of Easter continues as the risen Lord appears to his disciples. His words to Thomas offer a blessing to all who entrust themselves in faith to the risen Lord.

Sunday, April 15, 2018 Third Sunday of Easter

The gospel for the third Sunday of Easter is always one in which the risen Christ shares food with the disciples, meals that are the Easter template for the meal we share each Lord's day. In today's gospel, Jesus both shares the disciples' food and shows them the meaning of his suffering, death, and resurrection through the scriptures: the two main elements of our Sunday worship.

First Reading: Acts 3:12-19

After healing a crippled man, Peter preaches to the people how God's promises to Israel have been fulfilled in Jesus. Through the proclamation of Christ's death and resurrection, God is offering them forgiveness and restoration in Jesus' name.

Psalm: Psalm 4

The LORD does wonders for the faithful. (Ps. 4:3)

Second Reading: 1 John 3:1-7

God has loved us in order to make us children of God. Though we do not yet know the full details of our future existence, we trust that God will reveal it just as God revealed Jesus to take away our sins.

Gospel: Luke 24:36b-48

In this account of an appearance after his resurrection, Jesus opens the minds of the disciples to understand him as Messiah. Jesus convinces them that he has been raised and sends them on a mission to proclaim the message of repentance and forgiveness.

Sunday, April 22, 2018 Fourth Sunday of Easter

The image of the Good Shepherd shows us how the risen Christ brings us to life. It is the relationship between the shepherd and the sheep, one of mutual knowledge and love, that gives the shepherd authority. The shepherd's willingness to lay down his life for the sheep shows his love. First John illustrates what it means to lay down our lives for one another by the example of sharing our wealth with any sister or brother in need.

First Reading: Acts 4:5-12

Peter and John had been arrested the previous day because they were proclaiming the news of the resurrection to the people. In today's reading, Peter is filled with the Holy Spirit so that he is able to proclaim salvation in Jesus' name to the religious authorities.

Psalm: Psalm 23

The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not be in want. (Ps. 23:1)

Second Reading: 1 John 3:16-24

Jesus' death on our behalf is the clearest demonstration of divine love. This is the very love we share with others, not just through our words but especially through our deeds. In sharing such love we fulfill God's commandments.

Gospel: John 10:11-18

In language that recalls the twenty-third psalm, Jesus describes himself as the shepherd who cares for his sheep. He is willing to die for them, and he is able to overcome death for them.

Sunday, April 29, 2018 Fifth Sunday of Easter

This Sunday's image of how the risen Christ shares his life with us is the image of the vine. Christ the vine and we the branches are alive in each other, in the mystery of mutual abiding that we read of in the gospel and the first letter of John. Baptism makes us a part of Christ's living and life-giving self and makes us alive with Christ's life. As the vine brings food to the branches, Christ feeds us at his table. We are sent out to bear fruit for the life of the world.

First Reading: Acts 8:26-40

Led by the Spirit, Philip encounters an Ethiopian official who is returning to his African home after having been to Jerusalem to worship. Philip uses their encounter to proclaim the gospel to him. Upon coming to faith in Jesus, the Ethiopian is baptized by Philip.

Psalm: Psalm 22:25-31

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD. (Ps. 22:27)

Second Reading: 1 John 4:7-21

We love God and others because God first loved us. We cannot say we love God, whom we have not seen, while hating fellow Christians, whom we regularly see. Love toward God is to be matched by love toward others because the essence of God is love.

Gospel: John 15:1-8

On the night of his arrest, Jesus taught his disciples about the relationship they would have with him. Those who abide in his word and love would bear fruit, for apart from him, they could do nothing.




