## SEASON OF LENT -TIME FOR REFLECTING, RECONNECTING AND RECOMMITTING

From February 26 (Ash Wednesday), continuing to April 11 (Holy Saturday), we will celebrate the 40 days of Lent. When we look at the calendar, however, we realize there are actually 45 days in that time period. Those extra days are the Sundays not included in the Lenten observance. During these "free" days, it is traditional to celebrate the resurrection of Christ - "little Easters." For we are indeed "Easter people."

What is your tradition for the season? Rooted in Jesus' 40 days of fasting in the wilderness, do you fast? Do you give up something? Or do you add something? Usually if one does something for that length of time - 40 days it becomes a habit. During this time, we are able to reflect, examine and learn. Lent is about spiritual results.

With this Lenten season, let's commit to continuing or adding a habit of coming together for all the opportunities offered to us during this holy season. Share in the time of fellowship and food on the five Wednesday evenings, March 4-April 1, in the FAB (reservations requested) followed by a 6:30 p.m. worship opportunity in the Sanctuary. A 12:00 noon worship opportunity will also be available in the Sanctuary on these Wednesdays. Join in the reflective services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, April 9 and 10. And, recommit to attending Sunday School and worship each Sunday.

## LENTEN OFFERINGS

Traditionally during Lent we give up material things to focus our attention on God's spiritual gifts and to provide aid to the poor.

You should have received a special offering envelope in the mail so you can make daily offerings throughout the Lenten season. You are invited to return your offering envelope during Holy Week. Our Lenten Offerings go to local charities that assist homeless individuals and families: Family Shelter, Providence Home for Men, and The Women's Shelter.

Family Shelter provides emergency shelter for up to 120 days for 15 families at a time. Residents receive help in finding employment and affordable housing so they can become independent. The Family Shelter also provides counseling and parent education classes.

Providence Home for Men is to help stabilize the living conditions of dislocated men and to encourage progress in realizing their full personal potential in self-sufficient living through the power of Jesus Christ.

The Women's Shelter provides a variety of support services for "women in crisis." It provides temporary shelter for up to 90 days and transitional housing for up to two years, serving about 90 residents a year.

## A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

During our recent council retreat we focused on the theme of God's abundance. In that retreat, we talked about the fact that we are constantly being pulled toward thinking about scarcity. Advertisements play heavily on this theme. We hear and see reminders of what we don't have. We are made to worry that we won't have enough for tomorrow or for a rainy day or for retirement. We are made to believe that if we only buy the right item or acquire the next great thing we will be fulfilled. We are fed this message that if we don't get more for ourselves, we may miss out and others will get the better of us. But God's words are words of abundance and life.

In our retreat we dealt with two of Jesus' miracles from Mark's gospel: The feeding of the 5,000 (Chapter 6) and the feeding of the 4,000 (Chapter 8). Mark tells us Jesus performed not one but two feeding miracles. After each one, the disciples got into a boat and immediately ran into trouble. The first time, they faced an adverse wind and were afraid they would drown. Jesus walked toward them on the water and got into the boat and calmed the weather. Mark tells us the disciples were astounded "because they did not understand about the loaves." That is, they failed to recognize the abundant presence of Jesus in their midst. They focused on the storm at hand, not on Jesus. Surely the one who could feed a crowd of 5,000 with 5 loaves and 2 fish would provide for them just as abundantly during the storm at sea, but they failed to recognize this.

After the second feeding miracle, the disciples once again got into a boat and set off. This time, they began to worry that they only had one loaf of bread for the 13 of them. Never mind the fact that Jesus had just fed 4,000 people with only 7 loaves of bread! Jesus asked them if they did not yet understand. Jesus himself was there with them in abundance and they focused instead on their scarcity of bread.

Despite the stubbornness and faithlessness of the disciples, Jesus offered them his abundance over and over again. In fact, he even laid down his life for them. Likewise, Jesus blesses us, his disciples, with great abundance.

At our retreat I asked our council members to generate a list of our "loaves and fish" here at Good Shepherd. We listed our members, our facilities, the love we have for one another, our music program, our Bible study, our children, our staff, our volunteers and leaders, and more. I invite you to ponder your own list of our blessings and abundance. How has God gifted us? This exercise of listing our assets; our "loaves and fish" helps us to concentrate on what God is giving us here and now to carry out our mission of worship, learning, loving, and service to all.

During the season of Lent, I will be focusing our Sunday sermons on the gifts of God's abundance. These gospel readings are stories of divine blessing meeting human lack and human loss head on. Here is a little preview of what we will study together as we continue living into and living out of God's abundance:

## March 1—Jesus' Temptation in the Wilderness

During a 40-day trial in the desert you and I probably would have focused on our lack of food, water, and shelter. Jesus kept his focus on God and on his mission.

## March 8—Nicodemus visits Jesus at night

In this passage we hear that most treasured of Bible verses, John 3:16—God's love for our world was so abundant, God sent his only son to and for us. This is indeed a gift of abundance!

## March 15—Jesus and the Samaritan Woman at the Well

Here the Samaritan woman focuses on literal water and Jesus' disciples focus on literal food, but Jesus focuses on the gifts and the will of God.

## March 22—Jesus heals a man born blind

Jesus, the Light of the World, makes his light and life literally manifest in the life of this man who lived in darkness up to the time he met Jesus. While the disciples wonder about whether this man or his parents were sinners to have "deserved" his blindness, Jesus redirects their focus toward the glory and light of God through his healing work.

## March 29—Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead

In a jarring display of compassion and power, Jesus shows what it means for God's life to be present in and through him by restoring Lazarus' life. Human loss, grief, and pain will, in God's time, give way to Jesus' abundant life.

I pray you will join me on Sundays during Lent as we explore this theme of abundance together. God is indeed richly blessing this congregation and its members and God is calling us to a greater awareness of this abundance and of the wonderful ways in which we can share in God's mission of reconciliation. Let's work together identifying our "loaves and fish" and let's offer these blessings up to God as we worship, learn, love and serve all.

## MESSAGE FROM YOUR COUNCIL PRESIDENT....

Council has gotten off to a great start this year. Recently we met in the FAB for two half day sessions with Pastor Andrew for our annual council retreat. It was a very fulfilling time with lots of open discussion getting to know each other better and getting to know Pastor Andrew better and his approach to our future.

Rather than sit around and speculate on 10 year goals, Pastor Andrew began by an open discussion of our duties as a Congregational Council. We discussed our role within the church to care for our ministries and to carry the mission of Good Shepherd forward both in the congregation and the community. He stated that "clarity of purpose and a missional focus begins with us."

Pastor Andrew focused on abundance and scarcity and how those two things played out in our lives as well as in Good Shepherd. He used the story of Jesus feeding the 5000 with 5 loaves and 2 fishes illustrating that with a little we can make things go along way just as Jesus did. He asked, "just what are our loaves and fishes"? We all wrote down examples. No surprise most of the answers were in the abundance category particularly here at Good Shepherd. While we were all thankful for great facilities, and the likes, council all agreed that most importantly we have a very loving family here and a generous congregation. Treating each other like family and helping in times of need were very important to all of us.

Our second session was a discussion of our Mission statement which now reads "We are a community of all ages gathered by God's grace for worship, learning, loving, and service to all." While looking closely and tying everything together we need to ask ourselves is what we are doing moving us deeper into our mission? Every decision from committees up should be discussed in context of our mission statement. Pastor Andrew believes "that if a decision does not move us deeper in our mission, we should hold off so we will not be distracted from our mission. If a decision does move us forward, then we should work together to make it happen."

Of course, one of the key parts to all of this is clear communication between the congregation, the committees and council. Pastor Andrew said, "If we are changing for the sake of changing, we are spinning our wheels." And that when we make changes "we should be in the habit of explaining not just what we are doing, but why we are doing it." We should also, "take into account our mutual ministry and the overlapping nature of our committee structure. Who else will this affect? Who else needs to know?"

Pastor Andrew left us with 3 take away questions:

- 1. "How are we gifted and equipped for each new issue." (our loaves and fishes)
- 2. "Are we working towards God's mission?" (growing in our mission)
- 3. "Are we clearly communicating our plan?"

So, you see we have our work cut out for us this year. Our goal is to strive to keep in mind these points while making decisions on behalf of the congregation in 2020 while staying to the mission of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.

Thanks to Pastor Andrew for an informative and meaningful council retreat.

Thanks to Rebecca Richardson for serving as our treasurer over the last two years. Effective January 1 of this year Rebecca has handed the reins of treasurer over to Jamie Sanders. Thanks Rebecca for being a faithful servant of Good Shepherd.

Now to close, I have some exciting news for those who have not already heard through that old proverbial grapevine. Beginning March 2, Cody Jones will assume the position of part time music director. His job duties will be working with the late service choir and children. Michael Simmons will continue to lead the contemporary service. While we welcome Cody back, we give thanks to Jim Johnson for his longer than expected position of interim music director. Thanks, Jim, for serving and a great job. Maybe now Jim will be able to enjoy his retirement. Jim has agreed to help within the program in any way he can.

# OUR CAPITAL FUNDS ACCOUNT A NOTE FROM THE PROPERTY COMMITTEE

A number of years ago, when the Sanctuary/Narthex mortgage was paid off early by a member of the congregation, the church established a Capital Funds account. This account was funded the first few years by the monies that would have gone to making the mortgage payments. The desire was to have a minimum of \$100,000 in this account so that large, unbudgeted expenses could be met without having to

borrow the money. Over the years this account has fluctuated around the \$100,000 minimum, balancing out from contributions and expenses.

The current balance in this account is approximately \$124,000. This looks like we're in great shape, but unfortunately, looks can be deceiving. The \$49,000 Narthex Roof repair settlement money is in this account. This will be spent next month when the roof is repaired, leaving an actual balance of \$75,000.

Additionally, the Christmas day, 2019 flooding in the lower Sanctuary was not covered by our insurance policy. The claim was denied since the water penetration came from outside of the building, a standard exclusion in most insurance policies. The cost of the plumbing repairs, attempted water remediation, damaged carpet replacement and wall repairs was \$28,000. Pending Congregational Council approval, these bills will have to be paid from Capital Funds, leaving a balance of \$47,000.

The HVAC system in the Education Building was patched up last summer and again this fall. Parts are not available and the next failure would be the last. Prudence dictates that we move to replace this system this spring. For energy efficiency and the reduced impact of a HVAC failure, we plan to abandon the one system design for the entire building and replace it with four separate units, each servicing a designated zone. Estimates are being obtained and are most likely in the \$45,000 to \$50,000 range. If the congregation approves this expenditure, it would wipe out the remainder of the Capital Funds.

These are the facts. This article is not intended to create a sense of panic or impending doom. It is to provide each member of the congregation with the information needed to make sound financial decisions this year. We're a generous congregation and have never failed to meet financial challenges in the past.

- 5. Converts cheer from the sidelines. Disciples are in the game.
- 6. Converts hear the word of God. Disciples live it.
- 7. Converts follow the rules. Disciples follow Jesus.
- 8. Converts are all about believing. Disciples are all about being.
- 9. Converts are comfortable. Disciples make sacrifices.
- 10. Converts talk. Disciples make more disciples.

# **LECTIONARY FOR MARCH 2020**

## MARCH 1 - FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT

Today's gospel tells of Jesus' temptation in the desert. His forty-day fast becomes the basis of our Lenten pilgrimage. In the early church Lent was a time of intense preparation for those to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. This catechetical focus on the meaning of faith is at the heart of our Lenten journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. Hungry for God's mercy, we receive the bread of life to nourish us for the days ahead.

## FIRST READING - Genesis 2:15-17, 3:1-7

Human beings were formed with great care, to be in relationship with the creator, creation, and one another. The serpent's promise to the first couple that their eyes would be opened led, ironically, to the discovery only that they were naked.

## PSALM - Psalm 32

Mercy embraces those who trust in the LORD. (Ps. 32:10) **SECOND READING – Romans 5:12-19** 

Through Adam's disobedience, humanity came under bondage to sin and death, from which we cannot free ourselves. In Christ's obedient death, God graciously showers on us the free gift of liberation and life.

## GOSPEL - Matthew 4:1-11

Jesus experiences anew the temptations that Israel faced in the wilderness. As the Son of God, he endures the testing of the evil one.

## **MARCH 8 – SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT**

During Lent we journey with all those around the world who will be baptized at the Easter Vigil. In today's gospel Jesus tells Nicodemus that he must be born of water and Spirit. At the font we are a given a new birth as children of God. As God made a covenant with Abraham, in baptism God promises to raise us up with Christ to new life. From worship we are sent forth to proclaim God's love for all the world.

## FIRST READING - Genesis 12:1-49a

God's call of Abram and Sarai has a clear purpose—that through them all the families of the earth would gain a blessing. As they set out on their journey, they are accompanied by promises of land, nation, and a great reputation.

## PSALM – Psalm 121

I lift up my eyes to the hills; my help comes from the LORD. (Ps. 121:1, 2)

## SECOND READING – Romans 4:1-5, 13-17

In the person and example of Abraham we discover that a right relationship with God does not involve earning a reward from God but entails trusting God's promises. Abraham is the forebear and model for both Jews and Gentiles, because we too trust that ours is a God who gives life to the dead.

GOSPEL – John 3:1-17

A curious Pharisee visits Jesus by night to learn from the teacher his friends reject. Jesus speaks to him about life in the Spirit and the kingdom of God.

## MARCH 15 - THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

In today's gospel the Samaritan woman asks Jesus for water, an image of our thirst for God. Jesus offers living water, a sign of God's grace flowing from the waters of baptism. The early church used this gospel and those of the next two Sundays to deepen baptismal reflection during the final days of preparation before baptism at Easter. As we journey to the resurrection feast, Christ comes among us in word, bath, and meal—offering us the life-giving water of God's mercy and forgiveness.

#### FIRST READING - Exodus 17:1-7

Because the thirsty Israelites quarreled with Moses and put God to the test, Moses cried out in desperation to God. God commanded Moses to strike the rock to provide water for the people. The doubt-filled question—"Is the LORD among us or not?"—received a very positive answer.

## PSALM - Psalm 95

Let us shout for joy to the rock of our salvation. (Ps. 95:1) **SECOND READING – Romans 5:1-11** 

Though we often hear that God helps those who help themselves, here Paul tells us that through Jesus' death God helps utterly helpless sinners. Since we who had been enemies are reconciled to God in the cross, we now live in hope for our final salvation.

## GOSPEL - John 4:5-42

Jesus defies convention to engage a Samaritan woman in conversation. Her testimony, in turn, leads many others to faith.

#### MARCH 22 - FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Baptism is sometimes called enlightenment. The gospel for this Sunday is the story of the man born blind healed by Christ. "I was blind, now I see," declares the man. In baptism God opens our eyes to see the truth of who we are: God's beloved children. As David was anointed king of Israel, in baptism God anoints our head with oil, and calls us to bear witness to the light of Christ in our daily lives.

## FIRST READING - 1 Samuel 16:1-13

Samuel anointed David even though he was the eighth-oldest son of Jesse and did not match his brothers in height or other physical characteristics. With the anointing came endowment with the Spirit of the LORD, designating David as the LORD's chosen successor to Saul.

## PSALM - Psalm 23

You anoint my head with oil. (Ps. 23:5)

## SECOND READING - Ephesians 5:8-14

Because we now live in the divine light which is Jesus Christ, we conduct our lives in ways that reflect the light of Christ, so that our activity is truly pleasing to God.

## GOSPEL - John 9:1-41

Jesus heals a man born blind, provoking a hostile reaction that he regards as spiritual blindness to the things of God.

## MARCH 29 - FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Ezekiel's vision of the valley of dry bones is a promise that Israel as a nation, though dead in exile, will live again in their land through God's life-giving spirit. Three times Israel is assured that through this vision they will know that "I am the LORD."

## FIRST READING - Ezekiel 37:1-14

Ezekiel's vision of the valley of dry bones is a promise that Israel as a nation, though dead in exile, will live again in their land through God's life-giving spirit. Three times Israel is assured that through this vision they will know that "I am the LORD."

## PSALM – Psalm 130

I wait for you, O LORD; in your word is my hope. (Ps. 130:5)

## SECOND READING - Romans 8:6-11

For Paul, Christian spirituality entails living in the reality of the Holy Spirit. The driving force behind our actions and values is not our sinful desire for self-satisfaction but the very Spirit by which God raised Jesus from the dead and will also raise us from the dead.

## GOSPEL - John 11:1-45

Jesus is moved to sorrow when his friend Lazarus falls ill and dies. Then, in a dramatic scene, he calls his friend out of the tomb and restores him to life.
