### **PASTOR'S MESSAGE**

"In Caesarea there was a man named Cornelius..." -Acts 10:1



Dear Partners in Ministry,

Everybody knows a Cornelius. If his name doesn't ring a bell, that's not surprising. He only appears once in the Bible. Acts Chapter 10 is the story of a Centurion named Cornelius who receives a special vision from the Lord. Cornelius is a "devout man who feared God, gave

generously, and prayed often" (Acts 10:2), and God uses Cornelius to help the Apostle Peter as he is called to lead the church as Christ had commanded him.

The central theme of this story is that **God** is calling people out of their daily lives to be part of the new church that Peter and the other apostles are establishing. The author of Acts notes that Cornelius, like many others highlighted in Acts, is already a believer but has not been fully drawn out in the use of his gifts. However, in that moment when the Spirit calls upon Cornelius, he responds with gusto to serve God as the Spirit leads him.

Everybody knows a "Cornelius"; these are the people in our lives who model a life of Christian faith, the ones we look to within our lives to help us live out our faith, the ones who put others first and challenge us to do the same. They are the people who take the gifts that God has given them and share them abundantly.

You may be thinking about some of the same people that I am right now: people in our faith community who inspire those around them as we live out our lives of faith. We give thanks to God for these people, and we strive to live out our lives of faith with the same gusto that they do.

Everybody knows a "Cornelius" – just with a different name. This month our Gifts Committee will host Cottage Gatherings at Good Shepherd to help share our vision for the year to come and to see how God is at work. As part of these gatherings, you will have a chance to share with others who the "Cornelius" people are in your life. We will be inspired as we give thanks for all of those who model faithful living and inspire generosity with all those they encounter.

As your pastor, I urge you to please set aside one hour to attend one of the Cottage Gatherings that we will be offering this month. I think you will find this time to be an inspiration to you as we give thanks for all the ways that God is at work in our lives and look forward to what God has in store for 2017 and beyond.

Everybody knows a "Cornelius"; it could even be you. Thank you for who you are and thank you for all the ways you support God's mission through Good Shepherd.

### **ASSOCIATE PASTOR'S MESSAGE**

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <u>and teaching them</u> to obey everything that I have commanded you." ~Matthew 28:19-20a

The confirmation ministry at Good Shepherd has been revamped, and I am very excited by it.



We have eight students in our confirmation curriculum this fall. The program is now three years long, not two. Students are meeting for sessions twice a month. Yet, there is more to this program than just the time spent in class with a pastor.

We've learned that the most treasured

aspect of confirmation is the mentor component, when an adult GSLC member is assigned to a student and they take time each month to discuss the faith and what is being learned. I have seen how these mentoring relationships have had a strong continuation even after a student affirms their faith as an adult.

We also now require students to visit members of the congregation who are physically not able to attend worship very often. We want students to learn the congregation's membership is valued in all its expressions, regardless of age, ability, etc.

You will still see students scribbling on yellow sheets during worship; these are Sermon Notes sheets, so the students are indeed paying attention when they are scribbling on the sheets. Likewise, students are required to attend Sunday School. A new component of the curriculum, though, is conducting Generosity Interviews.

Here are a couple of questions on the Generosity Interview sheet. Take a moment to consider your answer to them:

- Who is the most generous person you have known in your life? Please share a story about how you witnessed their generosity.
- How would you share with a new member the importance of them being generous in their financial participation in the church?

Let the pastors know if you want to be interviewed for a Generosity Interview. I promise you that it will be enjoyable and beneficial to both you and the student.

As you can see, the three years of confirmation studies are intended to not only teach and foster the students' faith but also to shape and equip the students to be engaged adult members of the church. If you have any questions, please contact one of the pastors.



# REFORMATION SUNDAY IS OCT. 30

On Reformation Sunday, we celebrate the historic Reformation with Martin Luther's insights into the theology of faith and grace.




Please join us on Sunday, Oct. 30, for either our 8:30 a.m. or 10:30 a.m. worship service celebrating the Reformation.

Church communities around the world are looking ahead toward the 500th anniversary of the Reformation next year.

On Oct. 31, 1517, Martin Luther, an Augustine monk, posted his "Ninety-five Theses" to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. The 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's 95 Theses, the doctrinal challenge that launched the Protestant Reformation, will be the first centenary celebration in the age of ecumenism, globalization, and the secularization of Western societies.

# "95 THESES. 500 YEARS. ONE FAITH"

The play "95 Theses. 500 Years. One Faith" is a wonderful celebration and examination of the Reformation, Luther, and the issues still central to our lives of faith.



Previously presented at the Synod Assembly, the play will be presented again on Reformation Sunday, Oct. 30, at 1:30 p.m. at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church in Columbia. There will be no charge, although an offering will be accepted to defray actors' compensation and

production costs. The church does not profit.

**Bishop Herman Yoos encourages all who can to see this work.** "What I liked best, " he said, "were the thoughtful questions it stirred up in me and others about how Luther continued to wrestle with personal doubts and temptations that are common to all of us right up to his last breath."

A discussion session will follow the play, with the actors, writer, director, and at least one Reformation scholar.

# **OCTOBER SOCIAL MINISTRY FOCUS IS LOCAL FLOOD RELIEF**



As we come to the first anniversary of the floods that ravaged Columbia and South Carolina last October, the Social Ministry Committee has selected the **One SC Fund** (formerly known as the South Carolina Flood Relief Flood) as the social ministry emphasis for October at Good Shepherd.

As we mark this anniversary of last year's terrible flood, we must be mindful that **our state is in the process of a long-term recovery** that is expected to last for several years. There are still many people here in the Midlands and in rural parts of South Carolina whose losses were not covered by FEMA or private insurance, and they continue to struggle in the aftermath of last October's disaster.

One SC Fund was created last year by Central Carolina Community Foundation to

**provide relief and recovery assistance in 24 counties** of South Carolina that were devastated by the flood. One SC Fund continues to work with a variety of local nonprofits in these counties to assist those still working to rebuild their lives.

### **LECTIONARY FOR OCTOBER 2016**

#### OCTOBER 2- 20TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

#### FIRST READING - Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4

Injustice and violence in the time leading up to the Babylonian exile move this prophet to lament: How can a good and all-powerful God see evil in the world and seemingly remain indifferent? God answers by proclaiming that the wicked will perish, but the righteous will live by faith.

#### PSALM - Psalm 37:1-9

Commit your way to the Lord; put your trust in the Lord. (Ps. 37:5)

#### SECOND READING - 2 Timothy 1:1-14

This message written from Paul to Timothy is a personal message of encouragement. In the face of hardship and persecution, Timothy is reminded that his faith is a gift of God. He is encouraged to exercise that faith with the help of the Holy Spirit.

#### GOSPEL - Luke 17:5-10

On the way to Jerusalem, Jesus instructs his followers about the power of faith and the duties of discipleship. He calls his disciples to adopt the attitude of servants whose actions are responses to their identity rather than works seeking reward.

#### OCTOBER 9 - 21ST SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

#### FIRST READING - 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Naaman, a Syrian general, suffers from leprosy. In this passage Elisha miraculously cures his illness, but only after Naaman realizes, with the help of his servants, that he also needs healing for his pride. This foreign general then acknowledges the sovereignty of the God of Israel.

#### PSALM - Psalm 111

I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart. (Ps. 111:1)

#### SECOND READING - 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Though Paul is chained as a prisoner, he reminds Timothy that the word of God is never shackled or confined. He encourages his young friend to proclaim that word of freedom in an honest and upright life as well as in his teaching and preaching.

#### GOSPEL - Luke 17:11-19

Jesus' mission includes making the unclean clean again. Unexpectedly, a cleansed Samaritan leper becomes a model for those who would praise and worship God and give thanks for God's mercy.

#### OCTOBER 16 - 22ND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

#### FIRST READING - Genesis 32:22-31

Returning to the home he had fled many years before after stealing his brother's birthright and his father's blessing, Jacob wrestles all night long with a divine adversary who ultimately blesses him and changes his name to "Israel," a name that means "he wrestles with God."

#### PSALM - Psalm 121

My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth. (Ps. 121:2)

#### SECOND READING - 2 Timothy 3:14--4:5

Paul continues his instruction of Timothy, his younger colleague in ministry, by emphasizing the importance of faithful teaching despite opposition.

#### **GOSPEL – Luke 18:1–8**

Jesus tells a parable of a hateful judge who is worn down by a widow's pleas. Jesus is calling God's people to cry out for justice and deliverance. For if an unethical judge will ultimately grant the plea of a persistent widow, how much more will God respond to those who call.

#### OCTOBER 23 - 23RD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

#### FIRST READING - Jeremiah 14:7-10, 19-22

In a time of drought, the people pray for mercy, repenting of their sins and the sins of their ancestors. They appeal to God to remember the covenant, to show forth God's power, and to heal their land by sending life-giving rain.

#### PSALM - Psalm 84:1-7

Happy are the people whose strength is in you. (Ps. 84:5)

#### SECOND READING - 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

The conclusion of this letter to a young minister offers a final perspective on life from one who is now facing death. Though others have let him down, Paul is sure of his faith in the Lord, who has stood by him and lent him strength

#### GOSPEL - Luke 18:9-14

The coming reign of God will involve unexpected reversals of fortune with judgment rooted in mercy. Jesus tells a parable in which the one who humbles himself is exalted and the one who exalts his own righteousness is humbled.

#### OCTOBER 30 - REFORMATION SUNDAY

#### FIRST READING - Isaiah 1:10-18

Isaiah announces God's displeasure with the offerings and sacrifices of a people who are without compassion. He urges them instead to do justice and defend the oppressed. Indeed, if they repent, the Lord promises, they will be made as clean as new-fallen snow.

#### PSALM - Psalm 32:1-7

All the faithful will make their prayers to you in time of trouble. (Ps. 32:6)

#### SECOND READING - 2 Thessalonians 1:1-4, 11-12

This letter of Paul begins with a typical salutation, blessing, and words of praise for what God is accomplishing among the recipients. By remaining faithful and growing spiritually during hardship, the Thessalonian Christians have become witnesses to the glory of God.

#### GOSPEL - Luke 19:1-10

Jesus encounters Zacchaeus, a rich man who is also a lost sinner. Moved by Jesus' acceptance of him, Zacchaeus becomes a model of discipleship. In immediate response to being restored to God's people, Zacchaeus ministers to the poor and seeks reconciliation with those whom he has wronged.


