

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REFORMATION SUNDAY, OCTOBER 28 CONGREGATIONAL CELEBRATION

On Sunday, October 28, our congregation will climax the 500th Reformation Celebration Year with a special evening of good food and fellowship in the Fellowship Activities Building. Pastor John's Message Calendar Time

Where I am today, while you are reading this, should be much cooler than Columbia and its environs. Why you ask? Because I'll be in or around Flagstaff, Arizona, where the highs will be in the low 70's and the lows will be in the high 30's – nippy on the bottom end, but quite nice on the top end, especially after summer in the middle of SC. I'll call it a foretaste of the feast to come.

And that pleasant weather will be on the way, even here. Calendars are inexorable, as are the temperatures that follow along with them. So, hopefully, during the time I'm away, the normal highs for Columbia (88F) will actually be the norm, and the days of raging 90's will have gone by. (We can always hope)

The calendar which rules our daily lives is not the only calendar with which we live. There is another: the Ordo, the church calendar. One which is working towards its end even faster than our daily calendar. We will have reached, by the time this is published, at least to the 16th Sunday After Pentecost on our way towards the 26th Sunday After Pentecost, which is the penultimate Sunday of the year, which is followed by Christ the King Sunday, the last Sunday of the Church Year. Along the way of this intractable journey, there will be several significant Sundays: Reformation Sunday (Oct. 28), All Saints Sunday (Nov. 4), Veterans Day (Nov. 11—though not a church holiday, nevertheless, an important holiday in the life of our nation), ending with Christ the King Sunday (Nov. 25), the celebration of God's work though Jesus Christ for our sake!

In concert with these coming Sundays will be cooler days, the coloring of leaves from green to yellow or gold or red. Nature will be preparing for winter's quiet. While we will be entering again into the season of Sundays in Advent – with its two foci of the coming birth of Jesus and the final return of Jesus.

The changing of the seasons, whether in our daily calendars or in the church calendar, is inexorable. Neither can be stopped or held in abeyance. And, while the moving of calendars closes off season by season in turn, one into another, this movement also invites us forward into new season after new season. The church calendar, in so doing, invites us through the life of Jesus and through the works of God, those acts done on our behalf, so that our faith can be fed and renewed, season after season after season. Amen.

Thinking Ahead to Christmas

The Christmas season is filled with opportunities to give. Every organization we belong to has a Christmas project that needs our support, and it can feel overwhelming. Here at Good Shepherd, we always have a variety of giving opportunities. So here are some options to help you plan ahead.

Angel Tree – A tree filled with gift request tags from charities supported by Good Shepherd will be located in the Narthex beginning in November. Each tag will have a specific item requested by a person served by the charity or an item needed by the charity. There will be a wide variety of gift requests, none costing more than \$50. The boys who come to us have encountered challenging circumstances at a young age, which has affected their view of themselves, of others, and of God. Our children reside in cottages under the loving care of house parents who are dedicated to providing a nurturing, structured family environment. By modeling a Christian family lifestyle, we teach interpersonal skills, moral values, work ethics, and citizenship.

Boys need bike helmets, skate boards, skate board helmets, roller blades. Cottage needs board games, puzzles, beds, towels/wash clothes, paper products, furniture and more. Currently, it costs approximately \$22,000 per year to feed, clothe and educate a child. LECTIONARY FOR OCTOBER 2018

Sunday, October 7, 2018 – Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost

Today's gospel combines a saying that makes many of us uncomfortable with a story we find comforting. Jesus' saying on divorce is another of his rejections of human legislation in favor of the original intent of God's law. Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are fending off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does?

First Reading: Genesis 2:18-24

Genesis 2 stresses that people are not meant to live in isolation but in relationship. Out of love for humanity, God creates them male and female, to provide companionship for each other and to become with each other "one flesh." The Hebrew words used here are ish (man) and ishshah (woman).

Psalm: Psalm 8

You crown us with glory and honor. (Ps. 8:5)

Second Reading: Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12

Quoting from the psalms, this passage from Hebrews emphasizes that Jesus, the one through whom God created everything and who sits at God's right hand, is also the one who experienced human suffering and death in order to blaze the path of salvation for us.

Gospel: Mark 10:2-16

Jesus announced and enacted in history the new reality of God's surprising activity. These two stories demonstrate this new reality: Women and children are accepted and valued, not dismissed as inferior to adult men.

Sunday, October 14, 2018 – Twenty-first Sunday after Pentecost

The rich man who comes to ask Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life is a good man, sincere in his asking. Mark's gospel is alone in saying that Jesus looked on him and loved him. Out of love, not as judgment, Jesus offers him an open door to life: sell all you own and give it to the poor. Our culture bombards us with the message that we will find life by consuming. Our assemblies counter this message with the invitation to find life by divesting for the sake of the other.

First Reading: Amos 5:6-7, 10-15

Amos was a herdsman by profession and a prophet by God's call. During a time of great prosperity in the northern kingdom of Israel, the prophet speaks to the wealthy upper class. He warns his listeners that fulfilling God's demand for justice brings blessing, while corruption and oppression incur God's wrath.

Psalm: Psalm 90:12-17

So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts to wisdom. (Ps. 90:12)

Second Reading: Hebrews 4:12-16

We cannot hide our thoughts, desires, and actions from God, to whom we are completely accountable. Nevertheless, Jesus understands our human weakness and temptations, because he also experienced them. Therefore we can approach the throne of grace to receive divine mercy from Christ.

Gospel: Mark 10:17-31

Jesus has been teaching his disciples about what is most valued in God's eyes. Now, a conversation with a rich man brings his message home to the disciples in a way that is surprising but unforgettable.

Sunday, October 21, 2018 – Twenty-second Sunday after Pentecost

Today's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who's number one, which leads Jesus to say something about God's take on importance and power. Here Jesus makes it explicit that the reversal of values in God's community is a direct challenge to the values of the dominant culture, where wielding power over others is what makes you great. When we pray "your kingdom come" we are praying for an end to tyranny and oppression. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great shame transformed to be the sign of great honor and service.

First Reading: Isaiah 53:4-12

This reading is from the last of four passages in Isaiah that are often called "servant songs." Christians are probably most familiar with this servant song. In light of Christian faith, the servant's healing ministry and redemptive suffering are understood to be fulfilled in the life and death of Christ.

Psalm: Psalm 91:9-16

You have made the LORD your refuge, and the Most High your habitation. (Ps. 91:9)

Second Reading: Hebrews 5:1-10

Using imagery from scripture and from Jewish worship practices, Jesus is presented as the great high priest who was obedient to God's saving plan. Through his suffering and death he has become the source of eternal salvation.

Gospel: Mark 10:35-45

On the way to Jerusalem the disciples ask Jesus to grant them seats of honor. Jesus responds by announcing that he and his followers will "rule" through self-giving service.

Sunday, October 28, 2018 - Reformation Sunday

On this day we celebrate the heart of our faith: the gospel of Christ the good news—that makes us free! We pray that the Holy Spirit would continue to unite the church today in its proclamation and witness to the world. In the waters of baptism we are made one body; we pray for the day that all Christians will also be one at the Lord's table.

First Reading: Jeremiah 31:31-34

The renewed covenant will not be breakable, but like the old covenant it will expect the people to live upright lives. To know the Lord means that one will defend the cause of the poor and needy (Jer. 22:16). The renewed covenant is possible only because the Lord will forgive iniquity and not remember sin. Our hope lies in a God who forgets.

Psalm: Psalm 46

The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold. (Ps. 46:7)

Second Reading: Romans 3:19-28

Paul's words stand at the heart of the preaching of Martin Luther and other Reformation leaders. No human beings make themselves right with God through works of the law. We are brought into a right relationship with God through the divine activity centered in Christ's death. This act is a gift of grace that liberates us from sin and empowers our faith in Jesus Christ.

Gospel: John 8:31-36

Jesus speaks of truth and freedom as spiritual realities known through his word. He reveals the truth that sets people free from sin.
