Advent Hope

So, the Thanksgiving Holiday has now come and gone; we are moving ever more deeply into the Holiday Season. At the malls, Santa has been there for young children for two or three weeks, ornaments have been in stores since September, and the 24 hour all Christmas music stations have been playing "songs of the season" for a while, and last, but not least, the Hallmark Channel is in a full court press of Holiday movies that will last to the end of the year. One of my neighbors has had his Christmas tree up for two weeks before Thanksgiving.

In all of this holiday cheer, Advent gets lost. Now I know that if you're not a member of one of the denominations that follows the church calendar, you're not even aware that this season of Advent exists. We do know, however. Advent is for us the beginning of a new church year. It is also the beginning of a new season of hope.

If you're my age and a life-long Lutheran, you know that once upon a time the color used in Advent was purple, the same color as is used in Lent. Now, the color is blue – the color of hope. I'm not sure when it happened, because for me blue has always been the color of Advent. The change was made when church theologians began to understand that Advent was much more about hope than penitence. There are two focal points for this Advent hope: the birth of Jesus as a human baby, and the anticipation of Jesus' return. These two focal points are reflected in the gospel readings.

Jesus' birth changed the whole world. His birth changed the world because it led to his death, burial, resurrection—in which we have hope. His ascension, which contains the second focal point, leads to our hope in his return. It is important for us to note that the hope for the world that comes in his birth and the hope that comes in his ascension are linked by the events of Easter. Jesus' birth is important because Easter happens. Likewise, his ascension is important because of the Easter events which precede it.

In truth, we sing "Joy to the World" because of the hope that comes at the birth of Jesus, our Savior, and because we believe that the ascension leads to "He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead," (Nicene Creed) we have hope in the promise of return.

Advent, staged amid the hurly-burly of our culture's "Christmas Season," gives us space to which we can step apart from all that is around us and steep ourselves in the Hope that comes with Christ. For this reason, we have prepared for the congregation devotional materials for every age so that we can be in preparation for the Christmas season –that we can fully appreciate the hope that arrives on Christmas morning. Amen.

I hope all of you have had a very happy Thanksgiving Holiday and have a very Merry Christmas.

SOCIAL MINISTRY NEWS

Ring the Bell for Salvation Army: Good Shepherd will be ringing the bell for the Salvation Army Red Kettle Campaign on Thursday, December 13, and Saturday, December 15, at the Wal-Mart on Forest Drive, Food Court Entrance. Sign up with a friend or family member to cover a one-hour time slot on either day; we start at 10 am and finish by 8 pm. Youth, 16 and older, can volunteer as bell ringers. Youth under age 16 must be accompanied by an adult. Sign-up sheets are on the Red Kettle stand in the Narthex.

Assistance for Veterans: Our Social Ministry focus for August was Hidden Wounds, a local organization formed to help veterans suffering with PTSD and other service-related problems. Congregation members generously donated \$626. We have found that Hidden Wounds is no longer an active service provider. Social Ministry Committee selected another local organization that works with veterans to receive the donation. The Big Red Barn Retreat in Blythewood has offered free therapeutic activities for veterans since 2009—equine assisted therapy, healing art, gardening, and restorative yoga. 
GIFTS OF HOPE: FOR CHRISTMAS— FOR EVERY DAY OF THE YEAR

PREPARING FOR 2019

The **Flower Calendar for 2019** is available to sign up for the dates to offer either altar flowers, narthex flowers, or the altar rose for 2019. Altar flowers are \$60, narthex flowers are \$50, and the altar rose is \$10.



Please sign the 2019
Flower Chart posted in the narthex if you want to offer flowers for a certain date next year.
Flowers not picked up by mid-day Monday will be taken to shut-ins.

Also, offering envelopes are printed and available for each active Good Shepherd family. The numbered boxes are personalized with each family's unique number. The offering boxes are available for pick up on tables placed in the narthex. Be sure to get yours as soon as possible to prevent costing the church extra money by having to mail it to you.

GETTING CREDIT FOR YOUR OFFERINGS

Donations are effective only in the year in which they are offered. A check received in January 2019 can't be credited for 2018 even if it's dated "2018." Make sure checks are postmarked by Dec. 31, 2018. Then, even if they arrive in 2019, they are still deductible for 2018

The best way to make sure your offerings are credited to your account is to use the Good Shepherd numbered offering envelopes assigned to you. Using your offering envelopes helps the offering tabulators and those who handle church finances for record-keeping.

Each Sunday while you are having lunch, a devoted group of your fellow members is processing your contributions. To help them do their job and make it easier for them, please do the following;

- 1. Use your offering envelopes or another envelope.
- 2. Write your name on the envelope.
- 3. Write the amount on the envelope.

If you don't want your pew mates to see the amount, turn the envelope over when you put it in the plate.

LECTIONARY FOR DECEMBER 2018

DECEMBER 2 – FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Advent is about the "coming days." God's people have always lived in great expectation, but that expectation finds specific, repeated enunciation in the texts appointed for these four weeks. The ancients anticipated a "righteous Branch to spring up for David." The Thessalonians awaited "the coming of our Lord Jesus with all the saints." Our Lord's contemporaries hoped for the time "to stand before the Son of Man." With them we eagerly await the coming days: another Christmas celebration, a second coming, and the advent of our Lord in word and supper.

FIRST READING – Jeremiah 33:14-16

In the Old Testament, "righteousness" often has to do with being faithful in relationship. God acts righteously both in punishing Israel for its sin and in having mercy. In today's reading, Jerusalem's future name—"The Lord is our righteousness"—proclaims that the Lord is even now working salvation for Israel.

PSALM – *Psalm* 25:1-10

To you, O LORD, I lift up my soul. (Ps. 25:1)

SECOND READING – 1 Thessalonians 3:9-13

Upon Timothy's report from the congregation at Thessalonica, Paul is exuberant with gratitude for them. In this passage from his letter, Paul voices overflowing thanks, joy, and blessings for the people of this growing church.

GOSPEL – Luke 21:25-36

God will fulfill God's purposes and, already, hidden signs of that fulfillment abound. On that great day there will be dismay, perplexity, confusion, and terror, but God's people shall be given strength to stand boldly and receive God's promised redemption.

DECEMBER 9 – SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Forerunners and messengers advance the advent of our God. While John the baptizer's voice in the wilderness may be the principal focus of the day, Malachi's prophecy could as easily herald the coming Lord Jesus as forerunner of the Lord of hosts. Finally all the baptized are called to participate in the sharing of the gospel. In so doing we prepare the way for the coming of the Lord and assist all flesh in capturing a vision of the "salvation of God."

FIRST READING - Malachi 3:1-4

¹See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. ²But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; ³he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. ⁴Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

PSALM – Luke 1:68-79

In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us.

SECOND READING – Philippians 1:3-11

The apostle Paul was the pastor of many new churches. He writes in this letter about his joy to be in partnership with the Christians of Philippi. Listen to how tender-hearted Paul, sometimes a stem preacher, is with his friends as he encourages them to grow in love and knowledge.

GOSPEL – *Luke* 3:1–6

John the Baptist is a herald of the saving Lord, whose way is prepared by "repentance for the forgiveness of sins." As we hear the careful record of human leaders, we sense the spectrum of political and religious authority that will be challenged by this coming Lord.

DECEMBER 16 – THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

The presence of the Lord "in your midst" in the wonder of the holy supper is cause for singing. The nearness of the Lord in prayer, in every circumstance, is cause for rejoicing. The coming of one "more powerful" than John, even with his winnowing fork in his hand, is good news—and cause for exultation—for us who are being saved. Great joy is the tone for the third Sunday of Advent.

FIRST READING - Zephaniah 3:14-20

The prophet Zephaniah's message is mostly one of judgment for sin. This reading, however, which comes from the conclusion of the book, prophesies joy for Judah and Jerusalem. Judgment has led to repentance, and God's salvation is at hand.

PSALM - Isaiah 12:2-6

In your midst is the Holy One of Israel. (Is. 12:6)

SECOND READING - Philippians 4:4-7

Despite being in prison, Paul is remarkably upbeat as he writes this letter. Here, he urges his friends in Philippi to trust God with all their worries and concerns, with the hope they will experience God's joy and peace.

GOSPEL – *Luke* 3:7-18

John the Baptist heralds the mighty one "who is coming." John teaches that preparation for God's reign is not a matter of identity but of bearing fruits of merciful justice, radical generosity, and vocational integrity.

DECEMBER 23 – FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Cradle and cross are inextricably connected on the fourth Sunday of Advent. Between a lovely tribute to the little town of Bethlehem and the blessed virgin Mary's magnificent song of praise, the letter to the Hebrews reminds us in no uncertain terms that Christ's advent is for "the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." It is the kind of tension in which the church always lives as when in the holy communion—with high delight—"we proclaim the Lord's death."

FIRST READING - Micah 5:2-5a

The prophet Micah, having pronounced judgment upon Judah, speaks of a future shepherd-king who, like David, will come from the small town of Bethlehem. (Ephrathah refers to the area around Bethlehem.) This king will restore Israel and bring peace. New Testament writers understood this passage to be referring to Jesus.

PSALM – Luke 1:46b–55

You, Lord, have lifted up the lowly. (Lk. 1:52)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 10:5-10

The author of Hebrews uses the image of religious sacrifice to convey the significance of Christ's coming. Through obedient acceptance of God's will, Christ allows his own body to become the greatest sacrifice of all, one through which we are made a holy people.

GOSPEL – Luke 1:39–45 [46-55]

We are presented with Elizabeth, John's mother, and Mary, the mother of Jesus, two women filled with the Holy Spirit and with faith. In Elizabeth's inspired greeting and Mary's song of praise we hear of a saving God who remembers, scatters, lifts up, and fulfills all things.

DECEMBER 30 - FIRST SUNDAY OF CHRISTMAS

On the first Sunday of Christmas we find the boy Samuel and the boy Jesus, both in the temple, both growing in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and humankind. We too have returned to the house of God "to sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God," who has gifted us with a savior. As the festival continues, "let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts." It is Christmas, still

FIRST READING - 1 Samuel 2:18-20, 26

Having dedicated her son Samuel to God's service, Hannah visits him every year when she and her husband, Elkanah, come to the Lord's house to offer sacrifices. God grants Hannah more children, and Samuel himself gains favor in the sight of all.

PSALM – Psalm 148

The splendor of the Lord is over earth and heaven. (Ps. 148:13)

SECOND READING - Colossians 3:12-17

Just as newly baptized Christians in the early church were clothed with white robes upon arising from the baptismal waters, so all who have received God's gift of life in Jesus Christ are covered with the character of Christ.

GOSPEL – Luke 2:41–52

Jesus grew up in a family that went to the Passover festival each year. It was in this environment of faithful adherence to the law that Jesus grew into spiritual maturity and an understanding of his identity and mission.




