PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The season of Advent is an invitation to do things that do not come naturally or easily to most of us in today's busy and hectic world. Through our scripture readings and worship, Christ invites us to wait patiently and to watch vigilantly. Furthermore, we are urged to be alert and to stay awake. In a world in which many of us don't get enough sleep or rest to start with, it can make us weary to hear one of the familiar refrains of Advent: "Wake, awake!" In our New Testament lesson on the First Sunday in Advent from the book of Romans, Paul gives just this exhortation to the Christians at Rome and to us: "it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep." For those of us who like to hit the snooze button, this may not seem like good news.

God rouses us from slumber during this season for a reason. We are to watch and wait expectantly for the coming of Christ—as the babe in Bethlehem, as the righteous judge of the living and the dead at his second coming, and as the Lord of our lives who comes among us as we gather for worship. This is a season to reflect on his holy birth, watch and prepare for his glorious return, and most of all to order our lives so that we experience our Lord's presence and become an embodiment of that presence in the world.

We put a lot of work into preparing for the first coming of Jesus this time of year—we send Christmas cards and decorate the house. We buy presents and prepare for time with family and friends. We go to parties and eat and drink and celebrate.

I suspect we put a lot less effort and time into preparing for his second coming. I suspect that "get ready for Christ's triumphal return" is pretty low on your holiday to-do list. But we are called to live with an awareness that Christ will come again. This assertion helps us keep our priorities straight. Since Christ will come again, how we live and treat others matters because we believe we will be judged by a merciful God. Since Christ will come again, the riches and pleasures of this life are not our primary goal, nor are the treasures of this life permanent in any sense. As Lutherans, we don't spend as much time or energy as some other denominations thinking about the "end times." But this time of year we do turn our focus toward this aspect of our faith. This is not meant to frighten us or give us special knowledge of how and when Christ will return. This preparation for Jesus' second coming is, however, a part of our walk of discipleship. Jesus warns us repeatedly in scripture to not be caught sleeping or caught off guard when the day and the hour of his coming arrives. If we knew Jesus was coming back tomorrow, I imagine we'd all live a bit more intentionally. That is precisely the call on our lives during Advent and always: to live as if Christ's coming is imminent.

The third coming of Christ that we are called to prepare for is his daily coming among us in worship, through scripture, and through the Sacraments. We are called to return each day to the baptismal waters, confessing where we have fallen short and receiving God's forgiveness and renewal. We are called to share in the Lord's Supper and to become the very body of Christ given for the life of the world. We are called to hear Jesus' words and to live out the Word of God in our daily lives. Christ comes among us, his church, each time we gather. And as we go forth from our worship together, Christ walks with us and through us to extend mercy far and wide.

So the question for us this Advent season is this: Will we heed the call to wake up and pay attention to the coming of Christ? Each day of Advent is an opportunity to increase our awareness of God's love and to increase our alertness to the difference Christ makes in our lives and in our world. I urge you not to hit the snooze button on this divine wake-up call. Walk with me this Advent season as we prepare for Christ's presence among us.

Yes, this is the December newsletter, but does this mean our thoughts automatically go to "Christmas," skipping over Thanksgiving and Advent?

As I think about sharing my thoughts with you, I want to share "thankfulness." This year has been one of challenges and accomplishments. I give thanks for our Call Committee's patience and perseverance in following the guidance of the Holy Spirit in the calling of Pastor Andrew to be our new pastor. Be sure to be here Sunday, December 1, at 3:00 p.m., as we worship and celebrate his installation as our sixth senior pastor.

I give thanks for the dedicated commitment of our Council who have led us during a challenging transition period. And, I give thanks for each of you who have continued to serve and support the ministries of Good Shepherd congregation this year and over the 69 years of its existence.

If you have not noticed, there are two new hangings in the chapel area of the old sanctuary building. One contains different views of the old sanctuary and the other is a shadow box holding three 60 penny nails. At the time of the building of the new sanctuary in the life of our congregation, I had the privilege of working on GS's staff as Administrative Assistant. And, one of the construction workers came to me one day with these nails when they were renovating the old sanctuary into the offices and chapel area we now have. He instructed me to "Save these nails! They don't make them like this anymore."

One can still get 60 penny nails, but how often have you seen a nail of that size? I believe what he was saying was – "They don't construct buildings like this anymore." Perhaps, he had not seen or used a nail that size in his construction experiences. So, it was decided recently that they should be preserved and displayed as a symbol and reminder of our strong history. The family of one of our charter members, Julius Hair, dedicated his memorial gifts to have this done. I give thanks for those charter members who were inspired and dedicated to plant a Lutheran congregation in this area of our community. Take an opportunity to view these hangings.



I give thanks to God for the many blessings Good Shepherd congregation has and for being God's Work – Our Hands to each other, to the community and to the world.


The first service will include a Children's Sermon. A nursery will be provided only at this service. Both services will include Holy Communion.

EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

An intriguing title, "Unavoidable Personal Evangelism" (by T.R. Halvorson) recently caught my attention. He asserts, "Lay Lutherans and personal evangelism have a strained relationship." I tend to agree realizing that many Lutherans rely heavily and solely on pastors to witness for Christ, but 1 Peter 3:15 reminds us, the priesthood of all believers, to be ready. Putting aside fear and maybe even feeling intimidated, "personal evangelism is basically having the core of the faith in mind and ready when

events, conversations, or questions invite or prompt us to share applicable pieces of it." This article illustrates how evangelism may come naturally and personally through ordinary conversations in our daily lives. One might "prepare" in many ways-studying the Bible and the Small Catechism, routine prayer, etc. Whereas, we Lutherans sometimes regard evangelism as a touchy subject to be avoided, it's really just about the willingness to share your faith. Share as naturally as you can even if your words don't sound right to you. Luke 6:45 states "out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks;" in other words, do it anyway! Intentionally recognize opportunities for personal evangelism, but I would caution not to "argue people into conversion." Scattering seeds of His word in a relaxed, personal manner will draw people to Christ outside our church walls. Want to know how to fill our pews? TALK with people and offer a simple invitation that leads to love, forgiveness, and the everlasting joy that is our God.

GOOD SHEPHERD FOOD PANTRY PROVIDES REGULAR AID

The Good Shepherd food pantry continues to provide regular assistance to those in our community who need help with their food needs each month.

In October, Good Shepherd's Food Pantry volunteers packed and distributed 53 bags of groceries serving 205 individuals.

In November food pantry volunteers packed and distributed 47 bags of groceries serving 194 individuals. In addition, volunteers packed 47 special Thanksgiving meal boxes as an extra for those clients who came in November.

Plans are being made to provide some Christmas meal "extras" to clients who come in December.

The food pantry distributes food each Wednesday between 1:00 and 3:00 p.m. Recipients must call beforehand to let us know they are coming, and volunteers have their bags of food ready for them when they arrive. Recipients may come once a month to receive food.

Your regular food and monetary contributions make possible the work of the Good Shepherd Food Pantry. The third Sunday of each month is "Food Pantry Sunday" when food donations are encouraged. However, donations may be made at any time and left in the designated bin outside the church office. And monetary contributions are always appreciated.

Dedicated volunteers handle food pantry activities each week. Special thanks go to Anne Rush (coordinator), Carolyn Adams, Patty Fowler, Verna Sawyer, Nancy Hubert and Libby Slice for their commitment to the work of the food pantry.

LECTIONARY FOR DECEMBER 2019

DECEMBER 1 – FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

The new church year begins with a wake-up call: Christ is coming soon! In today's readings both Paul and Jesus challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor hour of the Lord's coming. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes among us this day as the word and meal that strengthens our faith in the promises of God.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 2:1-5

The visionary message presented in this reading focuses on a future day when God establishes a universal reign of peace. Divine decisions will make war obsolete, and the worshiping community responds: "Let us walk in the light of that Lord now!"

PSALM – Psalm 122

I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD." (Ps. 122:1)

SECOND READING – Romans 13:11-14

Paul compares the advent of Christ to the coming of dawn. We live our lives today in light of Christ's coming in the future.

GOSPEL - Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus describes his second coming as a sudden, turbulent event that will bring about deep change to our normal, day-to-day lives. Therefore, he urges people to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly, because the Son of Man will come unannounced.

DECEMBER 8 - SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

At the heart of our Advent preparation stands John the Baptist, who calls us to repent and make a new beginning. As the darkness increases we turn toward the approaching light of Christ. For Christians he is the root of Jesse, the righteous judge who welcomes all, especially the poor and meek of the earth. We wait with hope for that day when the wolf will dwell with the lamb, and there will be no more hurt or destruction. From the Lord's table we are sent in the spirit of John the Baptist to proclaim that in Christ the kingdom of God has come near.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 11:1-10

Isaiah describes the coming of a future, ideal ruler who will renew David's royal line (the stump of Jesse). Gifted by the spirit of God, this ruler will reign with perfect justice. Enmity and danger will be restored to harmony and peaceful coexistence.

PSALM – Psalm 72:1-7, 18-19

May the righteous flourish; let there be an abundance of peace. (Ps. 72:7)

SECOND READING – Romans 15:4-13

God's promise to include Gentiles within the circle of God's blessed people has been fulfilled in Jesus Christ. Christians live out their unity by welcoming and encouraging each other just as Christ has welcomed them into God's family.

GOSPEL – Matthew 3:1-12

Just before Jesus begins his public ministry, John the Baptist appears, calling people to mend their ways and speaking of a powerful one who is to come.

DECEMBER 15 - THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

A note of joyful expectation marks today's worship. Isaiah announces that the desert shall rejoice and blossom, and Jesus points to the unexpected and transforming signs of God's reign. We wait with patience for the coming of the Lord, even as we rejoice at his presence among us this day: in word and holy supper, in church and in our homes, in silent reflection and in works of justice and love. We pray that God would open our eyes and ears to the wonders of Christ's advent among us.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 35:1-10

The prophet describes the return from the Babylonian captivity as a joyous procession to Zion. God's coming reign will bring a renewal of

creation in which health and wholeness will be restored. There is no need for fear, for God is coming to save.

PSALM – Psalm 146:5-10

The LORD lifts up those who are bowed down. (Ps. 146:8)

SECOND READING – James 5:7-10

In anticipation of the Lord's coming, Christians are called upon to cultivate patience rather than discontent.

GOSPEL – Matthew 11:2-11

John the Baptist expects the Messiah to bring God's judgment upon the earth (Matt. 3:11-12). From a prison cell, he wonders whether Jesus is the one who will do this. Jesus' response indicates that God's reign is indeed being fulfilled already through healing and restoration.

DECEMBER 22 - FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Today Isaiah prophesies that a young woman will bear a son and name him Emmanuel. The gospel is Matthew's account of the annunciation and birth of the one named Emmanuel, God-with-us. During these final days of Advent we pray, "O come, O come, Emmanuel," a beloved hymn based on the O Antiphons, ancient prayers appointed for the seven days preceding Christmas. On this final Sunday of Advent we prepare to celebrate the birth of the one born to save us from the power of sin and death.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 7:10-16

An Israelite and Aramean military coalition presented a serious threat to King Ahaz of Judah. In response, Ahaz decided to secure his throne and kingdom by seeking Assyrian help. Isaiah reminds Ahaz that human attempts to establish security will fail. The prophet gives the sign that is the only source of true safety: Immanuel, God is with us!

PSALM – Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19

Let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved. (Ps. 80:7) SECOND READING – Romans 1:1-7

Most of the Christians in Rome do not know Paul. In this letter's opening he introduces himself as an apostle divinely appointed to spread God's gospel. The gospel's content is the promised coming of Christ, and Paul's mission is to bring about the obedience of faith among all nations, including his Roman audience.

GOSPEL – Matthew 1:18-25

Matthew's story of Jesus' birth focuses on the role of Joseph, who adopts the divinely-begotten child into the family of David and obediently gives him the name Jesus, which means "God saves."

DECEMBER 29 – FIRST SUNDAY OF CHRISTMAS

As we celebrate the Twelve Days of Christmas, our gospel today confronts us with the death of innocent children at the hands of Herod. The birth of Christ does not remove the power of evil from our world, but its light gives us hope as we walk with all the "holy innocents" of past generations and today who have suffered unjustly. In our gathering around word and meal, God continues to redeem us, lift us up, and carry us as in days of old.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 63:7-9

God does not delegate divine intervention to a messenger or angel. God's own presence brings salvation. The prophet and all who read these words join in celebrating God's gracious deeds. God trusts that God's people will not act falsely.

PSALM – Psalm 148

The splendor of the LORD is over earth and heaven. (Ps. 148:13) SECOND READING – Hebrews 2:10-18

Through Jesus' suffering and death, the trail to eternal salvation has been blazed for us. We do not fear death, because he has conquered the power of death. Thus Christ, our merciful and faithful high priest, has the final say over the destiny of our lives.

GOSPEL – Matthew 2:13-23

In a dream, Joseph is warned to flee to Egypt to protect the infant Jesus from the jealousy of Herod.


