# **REFORMATION SUNDAY IS OCT. 29**

### "FREED & RENEWED IN CHRIST"

"FREED & RENEWED IN CHRIST" is the theme used by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in its churchwide observance of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation that began with the 95 theses that Martin Luther made public on October 31, 1517.

In Luther's writing "The Freedom of a Christian" (1520), he wrote "A Christian is lord of all, completely free of everything; a Christian is a servant completely attentive to the needs of all."

The ELCA's theme expresses this message



of the Christian faith's freedom and a renewed life of service to others in Jesus Christ.



On Sunday, October 29, we will observe this 500th Reformation anniversary in our regular worship services at 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. The Capital City Brass group will provide special music at the 10:30 a.m. worship service. Come and be a part of this special celebration day as we join our voices in proclaiming "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

Please join us on Sunday, Oct. 29, for either our 8:30 a.m. or 10:30 a.m. worship service celebrating the 500th anniversary of the Reformation.

In the meantime, Council has contracted with **retired GSLC Pastor Kathy Chartier to serve in a supply role for the two weeks** between Pastor Kris and Pastor Hawkins.

We would also like to say a very special "thank you" to Pastor Kris for his service to Good Shepherd. Not only was Pastor Kris ordained here but it also was his first call. It has been a pleasure to have Pastor Kris at Good Shepherd and an enjoyment to watch him grow in ministry. Now God has called Pastor Kris and Pastor Ginger to begin a new chapter in their ministry together. Godspeed to Pastor Kris and his family as they begin a new chapter in their lives.

# LET'S BE THE CHURCH TOGETHER

Among my favorite prayers in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* is, "O God, you have called us to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ, our Lord." This prayer has been especially meaningful to me as I entered or left a call to the ministries I have served as a church musician. I am certain this prayer is with our former staff as they transition into new ministries.

This prayer can give strong support to who we are as the people of God at Good Shepherd as we make our way through this time of musical and pastoral transition. # DONATING STOCK TO GOOD SHEPHERD HAS MANY BENEFITS

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church gladly accepts donations of stock shares. There are many benefits to donating stock, especially stock which has appreciated or risen in value since obtained.

The main benefit of donating stock is the capability to share your blessings for our ministries!

Another benefit relates to tax deductions. Typically the donor may deduct the value of the stock on the day donated versus the price when obtained. Please consult with your tax advisor to understand deduction rules and potential restrictions. Please note that this benefit is available only when itemizing deductions and not when taking a standard deduction.



GSLC has a protocol in place to transact stock donations smoothly and confidentially. First, contact our Council President

who will provide the Charles Schwab account number for you to share with your brokerage firm. Notify the President with the transaction date. You will receive confirmation of your transfer from your brokerage firm.

It is the policy of our church to liquidate all non-cash asset contributions as soon as possible. This protects the church in the event the asset suddenly loses value. Only our Council President has the authority to transact the liquidation trade. Proceeds from the sale are transferred from the Schwab account into the church's bank account for additional processing.

Your donation is credited to your quarterly donation statement from Good Shepherd. If you donate stocks and do not see the pertinent information on the next quarterly statement, please contact our Council President as soon as possible. It isn't often we manage stock transactions and we need the donor to help us ensure complete processing.

# HARVEST HOPE IS OCTOBER SOCIAL MINISTRY EMPHASIS

The October social ministry emphasis at Good Shepherd is Harvest Hope Food Bank. Harvest Hope was begun in 1981 by business leaders and faith community members who wanted to help provide for hungry persons in Columbia.

Over the years, Harvest Hope has increased its mission to serving hungry persons in 20 S.C. counties in the Midlands, Pee Dee, and Greenville areas. Last year, Harvest Hope distributed some 28 million pounds of food to needy individuals and to various local community organizations which provide for the hungry. On average, Harvest Hope feeds some 38,000 needy persons per week through the overall program.

You may place your donations to Harvest Hope in the offering plate each Sunday in October or give them to the church office. Make checks payable to Good Shepherd and designate them for Harvest Hope.

Good Shepherd's own food pantry provides basic food items to persons from our community who have difficulty stretching their food budget through the month. Recipients may come once a month on a Wednesday afternoon to receive a bag of food.

We could use more volunteers on Wednesdays for an hour or two to help prepare bags of food and to distribute them when recipients come to the office. If you're interested, contact the church office or Don Caughman, Social Ministry Committee chair.

### RAMP MINISTRY IS VERY ACTIVE

Many persons in our area who are confined to wheelchairs now have access to their homes via ramps built by Good Shepherd's wheelchair ramp ministry

### **LECTIONARY FOR OCTOBER 2017**

### OCTOBER 1- 17TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

### FIRST READING - Ezekiel 18:1-4, 25-32

Ezekiel challenges those who think they cannot change because of what their parents were and did, or who think they cannot turn from their wicked ways. God insistently invites people to turn and live.

### PSALM - Psalm 25:1-9

Remember, O LORD, your compassion and love. (Ps. 25:6)

### SECOND READING - Philippians 2:1-13

As part of a call for harmony rather than self-seeking, Paul uses a very early Christian hymn that extols the selflessness of Christ in his obedient death on the cross. Christ's selfless perspective is to be the essential perspective we share as the foundation for Christian accord.

### GOSPEL - Matthew 21:23-32

After driving the moneychangers out of the temple (21:12), Jesus begins teaching there. His authority is questioned by the religious leaders, who are supposed to be in charge of the temple.

### **OCTOBER 8- 18TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST**

### FIRST READING - Isaiah 5:1-7

The prophet sings a sad, parable-like love song about the relationship between God and Israel. In this song Israel is compared to a promising vineyard. Despite God's loving care, the vineyard that is Israel has brought forth "wild grapes" of injustice and distress, when fine grapes of justice and righteousness were expected.

#### **PSALM – Psalm 80:7–15**

Look down from heaven, O God; behold and tend this vine. (Ps. 80:14, 15)

### SECOND READING - Philippians 3:4b-14

Paul reviews some of his supposed credentials, which no longer have any bearing in comparison to the right relationship he has been given through the death of Christ. The power of Christ's resurrection motivates him to press on toward the ultimate goal, eternal life with Christ.

#### GOSPEL - Matthew 21:33-46

Jesus tells a parable to the religious leaders who are plotting his death, revealing that their plans will, ironically, bring about the fulfillment of scripture.

### OCTOBER 15 - 19TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

### FIRST READING - Isaiah 25:1-9

After a hymn of praise acknowledging God as a shelter for the poor, the prophet portrays a wonderful victory banquet at which death—which in ancient Canaan was depicted as a monster swallowing everyone up—will be swallowed up forever. The prophet urges celebration of this victory of salvation.

#### PSALM - Psalm 23

You prepare a table before me, and my cup is running over. (Ps. 23:5)

### SECOND READING - Philippians 4:1-9

Though writing from prison and facing an uncertain future, Paul calls on the Philippians to rejoice and give thanks to God no matter what the circumstance. God's peace is with us and binds together our hearts and minds in Jesus Christ, especially when things around us do not seem peaceful.

### GOSPEL - Matthew 22:1-14

Jesus tells a parable indicating that the blessings of God's kingdom are available to all, but the invitation is not to be taken lightly.

### OCTOBER 22 - 20TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

### FIRST READING - Isaiah 45:1-7

The prophet announces that Cyrus the Persian emperor is the one the Lord has anointed to end Israel's exile. The Lord makes this choice so that the whole world will recognize this Lord as the only God. Persia had a god of light and a god of darkness; the Lord claims sovereignty over both light and darkness.

#### **PSALM - Psalm 96:1-9**

Ascribe to the LORD honor and power. (Ps. 96:7)

#### SECOND READING – 1 Thessalonians 1:1–10

Most likely this letter is the first written by Paul. Paul is giving pastoral encouragement and reassurances to new Christians living in an antagonistic pagan environment. Their commitment of faith, love, and hope makes them a model for other new Christian communities.

### GOSPEL - Matthew 22:15-22

After Jesus begins teaching in the temple, religious leaders try to trap him with questions. First they ask if God's people should pay taxes to an earthly tyrant like Caesar.

### **OCTOBER 29 - REFORMATION SUNDAY**

### FIRST READING - Jeremiah 31:31-34

The renewed covenant will not be breakable but it will expect the people to live upright lives. To know the Lord means that one will defend the cause of the poor and needy. The renewed covenant is possible only because the Lord will forgive iniquity and not remember sin. Our hope lies in a God who forgets.

### PSALM - Psalm 46

The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold. (Ps. 46:7)

#### SECOND READING - Romans 3:19-28

Paul's words stand at the heart of the preaching of Martin Luther and other Reformation leaders. No human beings make themselves right with God through works of the law. We are brought into a right relationship with God through the divine activity centered in Christ's death. This act is a gift of grace that liberates us from sin and empowers our faith in Jesus Christ.

### GOSPEL - John 8:31-36

Jesus speaks of truth and freedom as spiritual realities known through his word. He reveals the truth that sets people free from sin. PAGE 15 XLI, ISSUE X
